RAS Artists in the Landscape En Plein Air

We are featuring artists of the RAS painting en plein air.

The box easel, or French box easel, is one of the most significant equipment inventions from the 19th century. There is no consensus on who first developed this box, but the incredibly portable easels with a built-in paint box and telescopic legs made painting *en Plein air* much easier. These easels fold up into the size of a briefcase, making them easy to transport and easy to store, and are still popular among artists today.

Next in the series is of Fellow, George Largent and his artist statement is:

"Sketching, drawing, or painting in the great outdoors is one of the most satisfying things an artist can do.

I've always avoided painting from photographs, it seems so constricting and nowhere as much fun.

My large watercolours of course are almost impossible for me to do outside my studio, but all are products of smaller sketches and paintings done on site.

Everywhere I go I take my "kit" just a small bag consisting of sketch pad, pens, little watercolour pan set and water brush.

Whether it's countryside, seaside or city building it's all such great fun."

Paint Away

Sometime during the winter of 1988, a group of us from the Castle Hill Art Society were painting en plein air in Bathurst when I received news that I had been accepted as an Exhibiting Member of the RAS. I started demonstrating painting techniques at art societies including egg tempera, an ancient technique learned from Fokas, famous Greek icon painter on the island of Aegina, Greece, early in the 80s. I discovered Hydra at the time, an island that would become significant in later years.

Fredrick Bates was our President, an interesting man and wonderful artist. Our current President John Perkins was teaching and arranged en plein air groups on weekends and we would paint all day in great camaraderie. John invited me to meet Guy Warren and we got together a few times for lunch, talking painting. Lovely times. As Vice President of CHAS, I was a founding member of Combined Art Societies along with John. Life was busy with life drawing, painting, demonstrating, arranging exhibitions and exhibiting.

Over the next decade we followed my husband's profession while I connected with art groups and artists, joining life drawing and group shows. Early 1990s we spent a sojourn in Africa. I did field sketches in northern Namibia and illustrated a cookbook amongst others. We went canoeing and rafting on all the major rivers of Southern Africa, my sketch books at my feet in watertight containers along with the trip's food supplies and sleeping bags. Best time for sketching was daybreak before we started rowing, around 20 to 25km a day dodging elephants, crocodiles, and hippo on the Zambesi. A wildlife tour group found me drawing on the banks of the Great Orange River, next minute I flew to Botswana to guide painters on safari. It was a magical time.

We found ourselves in New Zealand. The best way to see a country was to paint through it, I decided and started a solo five-month journey from Cape Reinga to Steward Island. Another most rewarding experience and a year later exhibited my journey through NZ. I was an active artist throughout my NZ years all the while staying in touch with the RAS.

Back in Australia in 2000, I reconnected with the RAS, with art groups and over the next years, entered competitive shows, became a member of the AWI and just kept working and showing. Over time I travelled to Greece to see Desiree, my father's sister living on Aegina, in the shadow of the Temple of Afaia. Around 700 years older than the Acropolis in Athens, a place of great inspiration and mystery. Being so close to Italy, I met up with a NZ artist friend for a painting trip through Tuscany, Umbria and Sicily, a tradition we kept for two decades.

At some point I started renting a house on Hydra and set up studio. One summer I ran into old friends, Peter Griffen and Denise and other Australian artists came at a steady pace. One year, on a painting trip to Italy, my husband suddenly passed away in Spoleto. The hospital commissioned a painting and 'Faith and Hope' hangs in the public hospital, a large landscape diptych merging Australian and Italian soil. I retreated in solitude between Australia and Greece for a few years.

Recently I bought a beach house in Jervis Bay and built an art studio. The studio is now established, and I delight in my space, materials and sketching around the natural beauty of the nature reserves. At the same time, I bought an old farmhouse on Hydra, restored it during a bitter winter alone, instructing two Albanian tradesmen with sketches and mime as we had no common language. The results were sometimes hilarious but fresh and spartan, the upper floor a spacious light filled art studio.

Bougainvillea House'; is a couple of doors from the Leonard Cohen house and a short walk to the 'Australian House'; where George Johnston and Charmian Clift lived and wrote, and Sidney and Cynthia Nolan visited regularly. A throng of Aussies make their way to the Cohen and Johnston house every summer and artists of note either live or visit the island. Brice Marden, late American abstract artist was a local, as was colourist Tetsis, Ghikas and Craxton. The island exudes inspiration and creativity. In two degrees of separation, on the other side of the world, Susan Chick, adopted out daughter, wrote 'Searching for Charmian', lives in my Jervis Bay suburb.

I hope to establish an Australian art community, specifically for members of the RAS with 'Bougainvillea House'. Come visit, join me en-plein air painting, come for a workshop, take a retreat, meet artists and writers and feel the Aussie spirit on the island. William Kentridge from Johannesburg asked me this summer, "What's it like to live on the island?" It is a dream, I said, a dream over two islands, Australia and Hydra
