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The Royal Art Society of NSW is essentially an Australian Institution. Art is universal but the art of each country should be an expression of the national characteristics of that country and its people. The Society whilst welcoming portraiture, which is almost necessarily cosmopolitan in its style, and good work of every school of art, nevertheless has always striven to encourage Australian national feeling. The Society aims by every means in its power, to develop a fuller appreciation of the efforts of Australian artists to produce figure work imbued with Australian sentiment and landscape paintings pervaded with the spaciousness, air and sunlight characteristics of our typical Australian scenery.

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By its exhibitions, the Society not only places the works of the principal Australian artists before the public but gives the promising younger artists an opportunity of testing their work alongside that of men well known in the Australian art world, many of whom have passed through the Society classes and made a reputation in Europe.

Michael Kempson's Opening remarks for Royal Society Exhibition 2023

Thank you for the invitation to be a featured artist at this venerable institution. It may not be the first time you have heard this, but you are taking an awful risk asking an artist to open a show in which they feature. The consequence being that they drone on about themselves for far too long. Fortunately, my natural disposition leans towards the opposite, meaning a short speech which, no doubt, will be a relief to you.

I came to Sydney in 1980 fresh out of high school to pursue two dreams. The first was to be a professional cricketer and the second to study art at what was then Alexander Mackie. There is only one other practicing artist in Sydney that I know who also played cricket at a very serious level. His name is Steve Lopes, who coincidently you recently had him judging your Autumn exhibition.

The good thing about being an artist is that it is a more sustainable endeavour as it didn't take long, after a number of serious injuries, for it to be my total focus. I've been very fortunate, via my art practice, to have exhibited all over the world and work with some amazingly talented people, something I couldn't have imagined possible when I was a student.

Parallel to this has been a long career in art education advocating my passion for the mysteries of the print discipline. Technically focussed processes like printmaking require access to a medium specific studio, for in a very practical sense, there needs to be a sharing of expensive specialised facilities and plant equipment. The positive outcome of this is the altruistic sense of community that can be built in what is usually for us a solitary pursuit. Cicada Press, which has worked with over 230 artists of national reputation, was and continues to be a project that has sought to be educationally focussed by connecting artists with students of printmaking through the custom printing process. In this collaborative engagement insights into rigorous professional practice, the development of high-quality skills and the nurturing of longer-term mentoring relationships have been established, which are crucial in the development of emerging artists.

This is also true of the Royal Art Society of NSW which has been committed to bringing artists together, in the mediums and creative values you promote, for far longer than most in this city. I've checked out your schedule of events for 2023 and it is a packed program offering invaluable opportunities for creative development and community building. In addition, you have an aligned art school of dedicated artists offering instruction that will save students considerable time in their development. With teaching artists of the calibre of Greg Hansell you are in exceptionally good hands.

The still life theme in the printmaking, painting and sculpture displayed in this exhibition certainly has some parallels to my practice. I'd never really pegged myself as a still life artist, but I have actually had to rethink and claim this moniker. I must admit that for as long as I can remember my work has been about arranging natural and man-made objects in playful ways so that they act as metaphors for broader personal, societal and geopolitical issues.

Of course, the still life genre has been a vehicle for personal expression and existential commentary by artists for centuries. One example is the tradition of vanitas painting. While overtly focussed on addressing the inevitability of our mortality by pricking the egos of the privileged, it was also laden with social and political meaning understood by most at the time, with an obscure complexity that is lost to us now. But this is also true of the etchings of Goya, or even the late paintings of near contemporaries like John Brack, and any number of artists who have had something topical that they needed to communicate. While a clear understanding of the intent of an artwork might not always be evident it doesn't diminish its power and efficacy.

While I understand that I'm preaching to the converted here, there is nothing more life affirming than to be given the freedom to express ourselves as artists. To use the mediums of this show, with centuries of history, in ways that can vary between formal investigations into composition, considered observations of place and visual essays of satirical critique. And it is right and proper that it should be celebrated in exhibitions like this.

This core value is reinforced in what could be an apocryphal story attributed to the British painter and printmaker David Hockney, known to have produced a few still life images in his time.

Can I conclude by congratulating all of the artists for their contribution and formally open the Exhibition.

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ART BALLOT FUNDRAISER

The major fundraiser for the Society each year is the Art Ballot Fundraiser and it's a time when we ask our members to support this by donating a painting/s. The painting can be any size, medium and a subject of your choice, except portraits – these simply do not suit the fundraiser. All works need to be well framed and presented, after all this showcases your painting and advertises you as an artist.

If you cannot donate one of your own paintings, then a painting of high standard by another artist is acceptable. Please be generous this year for the benefit of the Society. Contact Secretary Christine and arrange a time to deliver your donation, or, alternatively if you cannot do so Christine will arrange collection.

If you would like a little history – the RAS 1880 – 2023 – in the late 1940's the Society decided to find a home for the Society instead of renting in various rooms around Sydney, so the search was on and in order to raise funds for this project, the Art Ballot was formed. Members donated a painting, tickets were sold and on the day of the draw and ticket holders took home a painting. It took some five years to raise sufficient money and in 1956 the Society purchased 25 Walker Street North Sydney and in March the following year, number 27. These premises had been turned into flats during the depression years and were in need of renovation. Over time this was done, and all helped by the fundraiser that were held in the following years.

Today the Art Ballot is the major fundraiser for the Society and with rising costs of rates, insurances, maintenance is needed more than ever.


