RAS Artists in the Landscape


En Plein Air

Next in the series is of Fellow, Susie Devenport and her artist statement is:

"I really like this photo as it epitomises everything I love about plein air painting: forgetting "self" entirely and any problems and just being completely immersed in what you are doing and the beauty of your surrounds to the point of feeling totally one with the landscape. When all of your senses are stimulated, it's a magical experience and the painting will usually work then too. I think it's a sort of healing meditation. A bonus is being with friends because of the company and camaraderie of a shared experience."



Have you wondered what happens behind the scenes at the RAS? by Secretary Christine Feher

Did you know that the majority of the jobs are done by volunteers here at the RAS, and by staff in their own time?

At our opening nights, of which there are about 10 per year, it's volunteers who man the bar, prepare food, serve food and wash and clean up at the end of the night. There are supplies to be purchased for the art school kitchen, tea, coffee, biscuits etc and for opening night nibbles. All of this is done outside of working hours, so at no cost to the RAS.

We get calls of donations of various items such as art books, easels, art materials, and we go and pick them up and bring back to the RAS. All done by volunteers.

Who fixes broken easels etc in the Art School? The answer is Greg Hansell who takes them home and brings them back ready for another pounding by students.

The Ballot fundraiser day is all done by volunteers including the preparations on Saturday before the Ballot for the live screening of the draw on the day.

The President and Council are here for selections, Council meetings, opening nights – all in their own time.

The ladies' bathroom in the Gallery was given a fabulous update by Robyne Dudley Jones which took several days to complete.

Hugh Cross gave his time to revamp the men's bathroom downstairs – scraping off old paint, undercoating and repainting and giving it a fresh bright look.

Craig Anand Young and Hugh Cross each have been giving the men's bathroom in the Art School a much needed 'new look'. Hugh has cleaned and repainted the walls and doors and Craig has repaired and cleaned the window frame, so it now opens. Also, a new mirror has been installed and the floors are about to be given a paint job. Hugh also repainted the kitchen in the Art School to give it a 'fresh update'.

Sue Sharpe donated an Olive Tree for the front courtyard, along with bags of potting mix and some frangipani. The front courtyard is almost finished.

The table and chairs in the courtyard are in the process of being sanded and repainted.

We had decided to trial "Morning Tea in the Preston Gallery' and it was Deb Morgan who gave her time on those occasions.

Sue Sharpe is here on a Thursday to attend to membership payments etc and to man the desk whilst the Secretary is at the bank and post office.

The Gallery is open 7 days per week, and these are managed by gallery staff who are legally entitled to a 10 minute break as well as a 30 minute lunch break. However, all of this is done on the run between visitors to the Gallery and answering the telephone.

It should be remembered that without the people behind the scenes at the RAS, none of the above would be achieved.

Sue Sharpe is the RAS Garden Guru – Sue gave her time and donated our beautiful new Olive Tree for the front courtyard, and also revamped a big pot which now houses a frangipani. This is what makes the RAS such a special place for many.



My Art Journey through France



Collioure in France is steeped in such history, not only because Matisse and Derain came here in 1905 and made the place synonymous with Fauvism, but it's main engagement with the workers of the sea, bringing back Sardines and Anchovies. As Matisse noticed there were hundreds of small fishing boats regularly moving in and out of the protected waters of Collioure. This was the rhythm of the town, connected to the tides and the forces of the sea.

The last night of my stay in Collioure I ventured in stormy conditions to the outermost point of the main storm wall. Waves were breaking hard against the wall which didn't seem adequately thick to withstand the constant pounding, so added to a tense but exhilarating experience. It was so dark the seaside, you couldn't see the size of the waves but their spray went overhead. In the harbour the waves had diminished to a gentle turbulence.

This is a drawing from my balcony of the hotel 'Les Templiers'. Here is a most amazing hotel full of quality art adorned throughout all rooms, hallways and bars. These are the works by many artists over decades that have stayed here, including Picasso, Matisse and many others of worth and worth I mean qualitative. It's nice to sense a continuity of comradery in a shared experience over time which empowers the place to be important.

I'm making my way back through Arles staying at Cecily and Chris's place, 50 metres from the river where Van Gogh worked. Then off to Nice before a train back to Paris.
